
1. What Is Humility?


Draw a picture of what comes to mind when you think of humility. How does this image connect with your life? Is there a story behind this?

2. Humility vs. Pride

Considering the opposite of something can often yield insights to help us better understand what we are studying.

It can also help to look at the Greek definition. The Greek word for Humble is 'tapeinos' The Greek word for proud is 'hyperephanos.'

3. Humility and Love

Read 1 Corinthians 13:4-8 in two different versions. Underline anything that stands out to you regarding pride or humility.

"This love of which I speak is slow to lose patience – it looks for a way of being constructive. It is not possessive: it is neither anxious to impress nor does it cherish inflated ideas of its own importance.

Love has good manners and does not pursue selfish advantage. It is not touchy. It does not keep account of evil or gloat over the wickedness of other people. On the contrary, it shares the joy of those who live by the truth.

Love knows no limit to its endurance, no end to its trust, no fading of its hope; it can outlast anything. Love never fails."

"Love meekly and patiently bears ill treatment from others. Love is kind, gentle, benign, pervading and penetrating the whole nature, mellowing all which would have been harsh and austere; is not envious. Love does not brag, nor does it show itself off, is not ostentatious, does not have an inflated ego, does not act unbecomingly, does not seek after the things which are its own, is not irritated, provoked, exasperated, aroused to anger, does not take into account the evil (which it suffers), does not rejoice at the iniquity but rejoices with the truth, endures all things, believes all things, hopes all things, bears up under all things, not losing heart nor courage. Love never fails."

Consider...

If I have thousands of follow-up plans that are amazing, a pantry full of great resources to offer, years of experience discipling, and can quote the whole Bible, but don't have love...

Get the idea here? Without love, nothing you do is of any value according to 1 Corinthians 13:1-3!

I will never forget once when Jerry Bridges was speaking, he had us draw a bunch of zeros across a page, then asked how much they were worth. It didn't matter if you had one or a billion zeros; they were all worth nothing!

Then he told us to put a one to the left of the zeros. He shared that "one" represented love. Love gives value to everything else we do.

One zero with the number "one" in front of it has a greater value than a zillion zeros without it!

So when we talk about the heart of discipling women, love is foundational.

How does having a heart that is humble relate to this?

4. Digging Deeper

Read through the following verses. Underline anything that relates to pride or humility. What else could you add to your chart from your observations?

Romans 12:3 "As your spiritual [leader] I give this piece of advice to each one of you. Don't cherish exaggerated ideas of yourself or your importance, but try to have a sane estimate of your capabilities by the light of the faith that God has given to [all of you]." (Phillips Translation)

James 4:4-7 You adulterous people, don't you know that friendship with the world means enmity against God? Therefore, anyone who chooses to be a friend of the world becomes an enemy of God. 5 Or do you think Scripture says without reason that he jealously longs for the spirit he has caused to dwell in us? 6 But he gives us more grace. That is why Scripture says:

"God opposes* the proud but shows favor to the humble."

7 Submit yourselves, then, to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. 8 Come near to God and he will come near to you. Wash your hands, you sinners, and purify your hearts, you double-minded. 9 Grieve, mourn and wail. Change your laughter to mourning and your joy to gloom. 10 Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will lift you up. (NIV)

1 Peter 5:-7 You younger members must also submit to the elders. Indeed all of you should defer to one another and wear the "overall" of humility in serving each other. 'God resists the proud, but gives grace to the humble'.

So, humble yourselves under God's strong hand, and in his own good time he will lift you up. You can throw the whole weight of your anxieties upon him, for you are his personal concern.." (NIV)


What is the relationship between pride and anxiety?
