Do not be wise in your own eyes; fear the Lord and shun evil. This will bring health to your body and nourishment to your bones.

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THE STRUGGLE IS REAL

"I am so frustrated." My friend exclaimed, "Sometimes the woman I'm discipling shows up, other times not. Sometimes, she comes prepared, having done what I asked, and other times not. I never know what to expect."

Discipleship can be challenging. However, I've found frustration can be reduced by understanding the difference between follow-up and discipleship.

What Is Follow-Up?

When someone first becomes a Christian, Jesus uses the analogy of a baby to describe them. What do babies need? To be fed, cared for, protected, given lots of love, and to have their diapers changed!

In Ephesians, Paul describes young Christians as infants tossed on the waves, not very stable and steady. But in Hebrews 4:12, the believers are admonished, "Though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you again the basic principles of God. You need milk, not solid food." Unlike physical babes, maturing isn't guaranteed for believers.

This is why we are encouraged to grow (Ephesians 4:15, 2 Peter 3:18). 1 Peter 2:2 points out how critical God's Word is for helping us do this. A basic fact for both physical as well as spiritual growth is you need to eat for this to happen. But babies often won't eat on their own. What a difference it makes when they have someone help them eat and then learn to feed themselves.

The Need For Follow-Up

When Billy Graham's crusades started taking off, and thousands of people were coming to know Christ, he became concerned. What was happening to all these people afterward?

Dawson Trotman encountered this same dilemma after picking up a hitchhiker. When he shared the gospel, the guy prayed to receive Christ. Dawson was so excited! Until he discovered the guy had prayed to receive Christ with him the year before, and his life hadn't changed one bit.

That's what got Dawson on the track of seeing the need for follow-up. He found it made a big difference when someone would intentionally come alongside a new believer to help him get rooted and grounded in his walk with God.

When Billy Graham heard about this, he came to Dawson and asked for help to develop a plan for "following up" those who became Christians at his crusades.

One of Dawson's spiritual grandson's, Charlie Riggs, created the follow-up materials Billy Graham used at his crusades. (You can read this story in Lorne Sanny's article <u>A Heart for Individuals</u>1)

The Goal of Follow-Up

So follow-up is helping a young believer grow. But what's the goal? What are you shooting for as you do this? And how will you know when you've accomplished this goal?

You want to see them become a disciple of Jesus!

What Is A Disciple?

The Greek word for disciple, $\mu\alpha\theta\eta\tau\eta\varsigma$ literally means a follower and a learner. Not just one who acquires head knowledge, but one who takes what is being learned and makes it the conduct for her life. We want her to follow Jesus so she can learn from Him and increasingly become like Him, joining in with what He's doing, bearing fruit for the Father's glory.

When a person becomes a Christian in a country where there is extreme persecution of believers, they have to be a disciple because to openly declare they are following the Lord, they must be ready to die for Him.

But in a cushy, materialistic society, surrender often comes slower. Many times, there is a process people go through before they are ready to die to themselves and commit to following Jesus wherever He goes, doing whatever He wants them to do, whenever He wants them to do it.

Also, before someone is ready to say to the Lord, "Not my will, but yours be done" she needs to be able to trust His way really is better. And trust He is able to do a better job guiding her life than she is. In our broken and fallen world, where people's trust has been violated and hearts have been wounded, this can be difficult to do.

So here's the kicker – you have to be a disciple before you are ready to be discipled!

A disciple is a follower and learner. To follow someone, you have to go where he goes and do what he does – and not just when he happens to be going the way you want to go. But you won't come to the point of surrender, where you're ready to follow Jesus when your heart is screaming to go the other way until you learn to trust Him.

So follow up is not only helping someone lay a solid foundation for a lifetime of relating with Jesus, it's helping her grow in trusting Jesus so she will become His disciple.

Growing In Trusting God

How do you grow in trusting someone? By experiencing them doing what they say they'll do.

This is where we realize how very great and precious God's promises truly are! God never had to promise us anything! But he does. A key reason why is so we will have the opportunity to experience Him being faithful to do what He said He'd do and grow in trusting Him.

One of the best things you can ever do with someone is help her learn one promise each time you meet, discuss it so she truly understands what God has and hasn't promised, and then encourage her; how will she take God up on this offer so she can experience Him? Then, the next time you meet ask how it went as she did this.

This is like Miracle-Gro!

Surrender

Now, as she grows, at times, she may look like she's following Jesus, but where the rubber meets the road is what does she do when God leads in a different direction than where she really wants to go? This almost always involves a crisis, where she reaches a fork in the road, and a key decision has to be made: will she go Jesus' way or her own way? It's a crisis because this usually involves something very dear to her.

For me, it happened when the Lord asked me to give up my major in college and follow Him, studying whatever He wanted me to (and He didn't tell me at first what that would be!). I'd always been one of those people with a ten-year plan. I was studying broadcast journalism and already hosted a television show for two years and had just been appointed the Assistant Programming Director for a radio station.

How I wrestled as the Lord made it so clear He wanted me to walk away from all this. Then, one day, in July of 1983, I came to the point of surrender, left that job, and became "undeclared" in my major. At that moment, I became Jesus' disciple. I didn't know where we were going, but I was committed to following Him each step of the way.

That was one big, "Yes!" that every day needs to be followed by smaller yeses! And it doesn't mean I always get it right. But it's a direction I'm heading, and by the grace of God, I pray I keep heading throughout the rest of my days!

So, you follow-up a woman until she is ready to follow Jesus wholeheartedly. And then the adventure of discipling begins, of helping her learn what it means to follow someone she can't see and helping her persevere even when all hell breaks loose because Satan is so not happy about this.

But oh, the joy it brings Jesus!

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDEBOOK

This guidebook was created to provide ideas for how the contents in the second collection in the Heart of Discipling Women Library can be used during one-on-ones. This collection focuses on helping women grow in trusting God through memorizing, understanding and actively applying His very great and precious promises. In the tool section of the Collection 2 Library, you can find the booklet <u>Tackle n' Trust</u>, which is available to download and print free of charge or can also be accessed electronically on a phone, tablet, or laptop.

This guidebook is written to provide the discipler with guidelines for how to take someone through that tool over the course of seven weeks and also includes resources to help disciplers continue to grow as disciplemakers.

Each week features a **Heart to Heart Guide** which provides a suggested outline for what it can look like to meet with a woman for two hours to care for her soul as you share the journey going through Tackle n' Trust. Be sure to follow Jesus as you prayerfully prepare.

We have placed within this guidebook the corresponding pages from **Tackle n' Trust** for each week as some people prefer to keep it all together.

You will also find supplemental material. Remember the goal in discipleship isn't a transfer of information but for God's Word to dwell richly in your life as well as in the life of the woman you are meeting with and for both of you to actively respond as you sense the Lord inviting you to. This is where transformation takes place and trust has opportunity to grow.

You may not need the supplemental material but it's here to enrich your own walk if you'd like to make use of it. Again, follow Jesus in this. Think of this guidebook as a feast where the main course are God's Promises served in the booklet Tackle n' Trust. Everything else are sides that you may or may not wish to partake of. There is content for weekly quiet times that provide opportunity to consider each week's memory verse in context, stories, and bookmarks for prayer (you can find printable versions in the tools section).

Jean's videos in this collection are gold and continue to address more of the soft skills in the heart of discipling women and are well worth the time to watch. But again, follow Jesus regarding what He wants you to do.

The Guidebook in Collection 1 shows how to structure one-on-ones using Jean's videos as the centerpiece. We call that the Heart Track. This Guidebook is centered on the Tackle n' Trust booklet and is the Tool Track. But just as the Collection 1 Guidebook included tools, so this Guidebook continues to address the heart. Both are vital.

May the Lord abundantly bless your time alone with Him in preparation as well as the time you enjoy with the women you disciple together with Jesus.

- 2. Listen intently to her response. Does it sound like she has surrendered to Jesus? This can be a helpful way to determine this.
- 3. Then share the story of your answer to this question.

Ask if she'd like to spend the next five weeks learning a promise from God each week and taking Him up on it.

Introduce Tackle and Trust. Then, read pages 5-8 together

PROMISE-BASED FOLLOW-UP

How do you grow in trusting someone?

One key way occurs as you experience them being faithful to do what they say they will do.

Imagine if I told you I was going to bake a cake for you and bring it to our meeting next week. If you didn't know me very well you might think, "Wow! That'd be nice. I wonder if she really will." If I show up next week cake in hand, what will you think the next time I tell you I'm going to do something?

You'll probably be expecting it to happen. You are starting to trust me. And the more you experience me doing what I say I will do, you will trust that when I say something I mean it... that I can be counted on.

Conversely if I told you I'd deliver a message to someone, perhaps you needed to meet them at the library at 10, and I said I'd tell them but then forgot – what would you think the next time I offered to do something for you?

Would you trust me if there was something really important that needed to be done? What if your life depended on it?

Trust is eroded when people fail to do what they say they will do. Someone can be faithful to do what they say they will nine times out of ten but if they drop the ball just one time, the next time they offer to do something you will wonder...

And here's the kicker – trust can also be eroded if we think someone has said they will do something and they don't do it. Right?! Even though I am the one misunderstanding, a seed of doubt gets planted in my heart when disappointment occurs – and it can take a lot to overcome it.

"God told me I should..."

New believers must learn to hold their impressions with an open hand. I can't even begin to count the number of times this phrase has been used to shut down a conversation, and shut out godly advice. For example,

"But Susie, he's not even a growing Christian!"

"I know, but God told me I should date him."

Or "God doesn't want me going to a summer training program this year."

End of conversation. How do you argue with that? And they miss out on a great opportunity to grow when really it was fear they were listening to.

What is Good?

We grow up all our lives defining good based on how something impacts us, how it feels, what the world around us says it is. Yet even experience tells us our evaluation can be wrong. Ever think something looked so good only to get it and discover it really wasn't?

Jesus says, "No one is good except God alone." (Mark 10:18) He sets the true standard.

God's will is good. Everything else is evil – no matter how "good" or spiritual it may seem. For example, if God wants you studying for a final exam but you go have a quiet time with someone – that's evil. Why? It's not what God wants you doing!

James 4:17 says, "Anyone then who knows the good he ought to do and doesn't do it sins."

Evil isn't defined by a particular activity. Evil is whatever isn't God's will. If God wants you peeling potatoes, then that is good, spiritual, beneficial – the best thing you could be doing! And to do anything else is sin!

But we don't automatically know what God's will is. We are told in Hebrews 5:14, "But solid food is for the mature who through constant use have trained themselves to distinguish between good and evil."

We need to be trained to distinguish between good and evil! To discern what is God's will and what is not. No one automatically has that ability. When a person becomes a believer, they may think they know what good is – but really, who defines good? God! And his thoughts aren't our thoughts, his ways aren't our ways, as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are our thoughts than his thoughts and our ways than his ways. (Isaiah 55:8-9)

Trained to Discern

So how do you get that training? How do you grow to the point where you can distinguish between good and evil? Through "constant use."

But constant use of what? If you read Hebrews 5:14 in context, you will find the solid food it's referring to is the Word of God. Through constant use of the word of God! By reading and applying (that's using it, right?), you aren't just getting to know God better and getting a head's up on how to best live each day – you are training yourself (KJV says "training your senses") to distinguish good from evil!

But note that word "mature" – maturity takes time. It will take time doing this before you learn how to make this distinction. And in the process, you will fail. You may read your Bible and think God is telling you to do something; you do it, and it all goes belly up! Don't think God steered you wrong. You didn't distinguish rightly! But this is how you learn.

It's like the old-time radios – you had to fiddle with the dial to get a good signal. Why? Because other noises come through and it takes a lot of effort to get the exact frequency you want coming in loud and clear.

All day, every day, there are many voices speaking to us: voices from our past, the voice of our own desires and fears, as well as the voice of the enemy! He is a deceiver. He loves to get us sidetracked, mistaking his voice for the voice of God.

So here is the dilemma – you develop discernment through constant use – and having daily quiet times is one key way to do this – as long as you are actively seeking to "use" the Word through applying it and living it out. But new believers need to hold their impressions of what they think God has said to them with an open hand.

How did you learn to walk? By falling down. A lot. Failure is a tremendous teacher. You will never learn to walk if you aren't willing to fall. If you have the expectation that from the get-go, every step you take should be firm, and you should be ready to run a marathon – are you ever in for disappointment.

New believers need to recognize there is a big difference between trusting what God says and trusting in their ability to discern.

This is why it is critical we help new believers understand how vulnerable they are to mishearing and misunderstanding God. It is critical they realize that listening to God is something you learn how to do, something that requires discernment. And this discernment will take time to develop.

This is why it is so key they develop the discipline of daily quiet times in a format where they are reading the word and actively applying it. Being faithful in doing this, they will eventually develop discernment!

But God hasn't left them hanging in the meantime!

The Gift of God's Promises

In 2 Peter 1:3-4 we're told, "His divine power has given us everything we need for life and godliness through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. Through these, he has given us his very great and precious promises, so that through them you may participate in the divine nature and escape the corruption in the world caused by evil desires."

Did you catch that? God has given us everything we need for life and godliness!. Everything! We have all we need to experience that abundance of life Jesus died to bless us with (John 10:10) and to be like Him. But it's just like Christmas – there may be a ton of presents under the tree given to you with your name on it, but until you open them and use them, they aren't going to be much benefit to you.

How do you get to know God? Through His Word! And in His Word, He has given us his very great and precious promises.

Why are they so great and precious?

Well, let's consider – What is a promise?

It's when someone says I will do something, and you can bank on it.

God knows it's going to take time for us to develop discernment – to learn to identify his voice and know what he's telling us he will do. So He took the initiative to clearly tell us things we can count on him to do. You don't need discernment when the message is clear!

Did you ever wonder why God makes promises? It's so we can grow in trusting him. Even as a baby believer, you can do this. When God promises, you can count on it! And as you do, you get to experience Him in action, being faithful to do what He has said He will do. When this happens, can you ever grow in trusting Him.

But just like those Christmas gifts under the tree, you've got to open them (to know what they are) and use them (actively applying them in your life) to receive the full benefit of them.

Lessons on Assurance

After I have helped a new believer learn how to have a quiet time and spent a couple of months getting her established in this discipline (once she is reading the Word, meditating on it, and actively applying it daily), we will camp out in 2 Peter 1:3-4 and I will help her understand her need to be trained to discern and how God's promises can help her grow in trusting Him.

After this, I will give her a copy of Tackle N' Trust. This is an excellent tool for helping someone get started on this adventure of growing in trusting God.

The first chapter focuses on God's Promise of Salvation. I explain how important it is to start with this, because a promise is only valid for the person it's given to. If I promise my husband that I am going to bake a cake for him, you can't overhear me and assume I'm going to make one for you, too. I promised him. So if next week comes and there's no cake for you, should you be disappointed?

But if I tell you I'm going to bake a bunch of brownies for you, you should be expecting them.

In the same way, there are promises in the Bible that God gives to specific individuals. Not all promises are for us. In Luke 1:31, Mary is told, "You will be with child, and you will give birth to a son." That was a specific promise given to Mary. Women struggling with infertility can't automatically "claim" that promise as theirs. God told Mary he would do this. And it happened.

But there are many promises the Lord has given to all believers. If you have entered into a personal relationship with God through Jesus, these are for you. But if you haven't, they're not. So, this booklet begins with God's promise of Salvation. If you've taken him up on that one, then you're assured the rest of these promises are for you.

This chapter is followed by four chapters, each featuring one promise: God's Promise of Answered prayer – John 16:24, God's Promise of Help in Temptation – 1 Corinthians 10:13, God's Promise of forgiveness – 1 John 1:9, and God's Promise of wisdom– James 1:5

What I find of great benefit is breaking down each promise phrase by phrase so you really chew on it to understand the meaning. You want to make certain new believers understand what God has promised – as well as what he hasn't.

For example, in John 16:24 Jesus says, "Until now you have not asked for anything in my name. Ask and you will receive and your joy will be complete." If you don't take time to really understand this verse you might treat it as carte blanche – ask for anything in Jesus' name and you'll get it. Brand new Porsche, anyone?

But God only gives good gifts (James 1:17). If we ask for something we think is good but it's not really, should we expect him to give it to us? Would you want him to? Initially sure! But if it really wasn't good?

Taking time to chew on this verse, you realize Jesus doesn't promise "ask, and you will receive what you ask for," does he? No. He says ask, and you will receive. If you ask for something that's bad for you, God isn't promising to give it to you, but he does promise you will receive something. And it will be good.

Do you see what a blessing this is? When we don't yet have the discernment to know what's good, God protects us while still being generous with us. Psalm 84:12 states, "No good thing will he withhold from those whose walk is blameless." If it's a good thing, he will give it to you. You can bank on it. So if you ask for something and don't get it, it will only be because it's not good for you.

But God promises when you do ask, you will receive something! You don't need to be afraid to ask because of your lack of discernment. When you ask you will receive good stuff – so ask away. And in the process, will you ever experience Jesus!

Reaping full benefit

If you take a Christmas gift, unwrap it, use it a few times, and then put it on a shelf in your closet, it's of limited value to you. So it is with God's promises. You've got to know them to use them. The best way to know them and remember them is to memorize them.

This booklet provides a wonderful jump-start into doing this very thing. When I go through this booklet with a friend, before we ever discuss the first chapter, we memorize together the first verse. We focus on one section at a time and I ask them to repeat after me. There are detailed instructions in Tackle and Trust that walk you through this process!). I find if people memorize this before doing the study on it, they process much better – and are much more likely to remember the verse.

It may seem stilted and crazy to take your time, going back and forth memorizing each portion of the verse, but don't go on to the next segment until they have the previous section word perfect.

And have fun with this! We will often do hand motions or a rhythm or even put the verse to music as we are doing this. One student I met with even created a dance as she memorized, where each word was connected to a different movement. Creativity helps!

We don't stop learning the verse and going over it until they can quote the verse word perfect. Even then, I tell them they don't really have it memorized until they can quote it word perfect 70 times. And I challenge them to review the verse ten times each day in the coming week.

It's critical they don't review silently to themselves. I encourage them to take initiative to ask others to hear them recite their verse and check them on it. Not only can this be a great conversation starter, but it also protects you from thinking you've got the verse memorized when you don't. I can't begin to count the number of people who "had it down" when saying the verse to themselves, but drew a blank trying to say it for me.

Usually, I have women work through the chapter on their own, and then when we get together the next week, we review our verse(s) and discuss the chapter, especially focusing on how they have put the verse to use in their life. I can't stress enough how vital it is you encourage them to apply it. This is where they have opportunity to experience God being faithful to do what He's said He will do and grow in trusting Him. Examples are given in the book.

Remember, it is vital you seek to use the promise yourself during the week. This really is where the rubber meets the road.

Very Great and Precious

There are a lot of promises in the Bible. Promises God has made to his children. And each one is an opportunity to grow in trusting Him.

After you have worked through the five promises featured in Tackle n' Trust, it is so important to show new believers how to identify promises on their own. Books are great for initially teaching something but you don't want them becoming dependent upon published materials. Ultimately, you want them to know how to identify promises on their own and be motivated to spend time meditating on them, breaking each verse down section by section to consider what it really means, then actively apply it in their life.

First, I walk them through the process using just the Bible.

How do I pick where we'll go next? Here it is critical to consider what is going on in their life. What are they struggling with? Is it fear? Check out Isaiah 41:10. Loneliness? Hebrews 13:5. Feeling overwhelmed? Philippians 4:13. Financial needs? Philippians 4:19. There are promises that specifically address each area of life.

I will usually pick out a promise that relates to something happening in their life and walk them through the same process covered in Tackle n' Trust — memorize the verse, then take time camping out in each section to make certain they understand what God has promised, then consider how it can be actively applied in our lives.

For example, an attempt was made to abduct one of our students on her way to Bible study. Did she ever wrestle with fear after that. The guys who tried to abduct her had done so right outside her apartment. They knew where she lived.

Isaiah 41:10 became a lifeline for her – each day as she came home from class or laid in bed at night listening for any sounds outside, she clung to this verse and wrestled to trust what God said. In the process, did she ever get to experience Him. Today, she is on staff helping others learn how to trust Him.

Ultimately, it's great to get them to read through the Bible on their own and highlight each promise they come across. This is a treasure hunt that can radically change their life, if they take the extra steps to memorize, meditate and apply.

Foundational for Follow-up

The goal of follow-up is to get someone to the point where they trust Jesus with everything. To help them progress to the place where they are ready to be a disciple – denying themselves, taking up their cross daily and following Jesus.

Trust is foundational to this occurring.

For some, this is easier than others. If your mother and father were trustworthy, it won't be as hard to trust God. But in a day when it's increasingly rare to find someone whose word can be counted on this can take a lot more time to develop. (I can't stress enough how critical it is for disciplers to be faithful to do what they say they will do. Establishing a relationship of trust lays such a critical foundation.)

But the more we expose God's children to His promises and help them really understand what each means and get them experiencing Him through them, does it ever spur them on in this process!

This is why God's promises are very great and precious. The Almighty God of the universe has taken the initiative. He has bound Himself and said I will do what I have said I will do. He didn't have to do this.

But oh, the pleasure it brings Him when we take Him up on His offer and help others do so, too!

The Lord is trustworthy in all he promises and faithful in all he does

Psalm 145:13 (ESV)

TACKLE N' TRUST INTRODUCTION

Trust in the LORD with all your heart,
And do not lean on your own understanding
In all your ways acknowledge Him
And He will make straight your paths.

Proverbs 3:5-6 (ESV)

Do you ever struggle to trust God?

I know I do.

- * When there's anxiety in my life, that's a sign I'm struggling with trusting the Lord regarding my future or the future of those I love.
- * When I beat myself up after I blow it, that's evidence I'm not trusting Jesus has paid the penalty for my sin.
- * When I grumble or complain instead of giving thanks, this reveals a lack of trusting God that He knows what He's doing and has a purpose for what I'm going through and will bring good out of it, which I'll be so thankful for later!
- * When I disobey God's commands, I fail to trust God that He knows best and instead trust myself to call the shots and direct my life.

Do I ever miss out when I fail to trust him!

So, how do you grow in trusting someone? I've found a key way is to experience them doing what they say they will do!

When I say I'm going to do something, you have an opportunity to experience and know me. To know either I do what I say I'm going to do or don't do what I say I'll do.

Let's say you need a ride home from a meeting, and I say, "I'd be glad to give you one. You can ride home with me!" But then I leave without you. The next time I offer to do something, will you expect me to do it?

Trust is slowly built and easily broken. This is why God's promises are so very great and precious - they are ways that God has given us to experience Him and grow in trusting Him - because He always keeps His promises!!!

Check out what it says in 2 Peter 1:3-4

His divine power has given us
everything we need for a godly life
through our knowledge of Him who called us
by His own glory and goodness.
Through these He has given us
His very great and precious promises,
so that through them we may participate
in the divine nature,
having escaped the corruption in the world
caused by evil desires.

2 Peter 1:3-4 (NIV)

Did you catch that? God has given us everything we need for a godly life! How incredible is that?!!! And how has He done this?

Through our knowledge of Him. That's not only knowing about God but experientially "knowing" him. Knowing that when he says He will do something, He does it! You can count on it!

This is why He has given us His very great and precious promises. In them, he tells us what He's going to do, so when He does it, we'll experience Him being faithful! And have the opportunity to grow in trusting Him!

When I meet one-on-one with someone, after I share with them how to spend time daily with Jesus and help them get established in doing this on their own, I always dive into sharing God's promises with them.

Why? Because after someone enters into a relationship with Jesus, they most need to get to know him - not just know about him, but know him experientially so their trust in Him will grow. This is a crucial difference between discipleship and what we call follow-up.

To be Jesus' disciple means to follow Him and seek to learn from Him. We can't do that unless we are going His way, fully surrendered to Him. And considering His thoughts aren't our thoughts and His ways aren't our ways (Isaiah 55:8-9), we won't do that unless we trust Him. So until a person has reached that point of complete surrender where they can say, "Not my will but Yours be done," and become Jesus' disciple until they are ready to follow Him wherever and however He leads even when they don't understand, they need someone to follow them up. They need someone to keep spurring them on to get to know Him better by spending daily time with Him and taking Him up on His promises.

Growing in trusting God is one of the most important things we will ever do!

Remember, God never had to promise us anything! But He does because He so delights in having a relationship with us. And you can't have much of a relationship without trust. Especially when someone's ways aren't your ways and their thoughts aren't your thoughts!

What a difference the gift of God's promises can make in our lives--enabling us to participate in the divine nature and escape the corruption in the world caused by evil desires!

In The Navigators, we have a rich heritage of trusting God and taking Him up on His promises! Dawson Trotman, the founder of The Navigators, used to charge people, "TNT!" This stood for Trust and Tackle the promises of God! Trust God for what He has said, then go out and tackle applying His word in everyday situations. (https://navhistory.org/2018/01/31/youth-ministries/)

In this resource, I've flipped the T's so you first learn how to **Tackle** God's promises (memorize and understand them) so you can better **Trust** God's promises for the rest of your life. As a result, you will experience the abundance of life Jesus paid so dearly to make available to you!

TACKLE: First, memorize the promise. Then take time to truly understand what God is promising . . . and what He's not promising.

TRUST: Whenever we act on something we've read in God's Word, it's a huge act of faith. We are saying, "I believe you exist and reward those who earnestly seek you."

Remember how I shared at the beginning God's promises are designed to help us experientially know Him? Yes, there are benefits in taking God up on His promises that are inherent in the promises themselves. But the most significant benefit is not in seeking the blessings the promises provide but in getting to know the One who is the source of all blessings!

Do you realize how much pleasure it brings God when you do this?! (Hebrews 11:6)

Of course, this resource does not contain all God's promises. There are thousands in the Bible! But I hope as you learn how to process and integrate these into your life and experience the benefit of doing so, you'll want to take God up on even more of His promises. And you'll be equipped with tools to help you do it!

One of the best ways to start acting on every single promise God has made--to take God up on His offer and experience Him through it--is through prayer.

4. Practical Tool:

- 1. On the back of their verse card have them create a grid where they can check off each time they review their verse. Make certain they understand even though they may be able to quote their verse word perfectly right now it's only in their short term memory and can easily be forgotten. They can not consider to have this verse memorized until they have quoted it 100 times word perfect out loud. NOTE: that out loud part is important and it's best if they quote it out loud to people around them.
- 5. Discuss ways they might be able to do this
 - (eg., standing in line or waiting for a class or meeting to start ask someone to check them on their verse - you never know what conversations this might get going!)

REMEMBER

- 1. What highlights stood out to you during our time together this week?
- 2. Creative Review (p. 18) Bring tracing paper and markers (Tombow markers or Caligraphy pens can make this even more fun if you have them, but are not necessary). Have fun tracing the verse in Calligraphy. If you don't have tracing paper or Tombow markers, see if you can re-create the calligraphy on another sheet of paper as you look at Debbie Friley's design. Have fun!

TRUE DISCIPLESHIP STORIES

A few months ago, I arrived at the airport thirty minutes before my flight was to depart. Sarasota has a tiny airport that doesn't take much time to go through, but still, I was thankful to have TSA Precheck. There were only a few people in front of me at the security gate.

As I waited my brain was filled to overflowing with all I'd been learning, synthesizing new concepts as I prepared to give two workshops the next day in Ft. Collins on evangelism for the Rocky Mountain Navigator staff. Plus it had been a bear to pack for this trip. Was I ever thankful to have that behind me!

I smiled as I approached the TSA officer who instructed me to put my boarding pass on the reader.

When I did, the light turned red.

"Whoops! I must've given you the wrong one." I was scheduled to change planes in Ft. Lauderdale before heading to Denver so I had two boarding passes. I quickly flipped through my apple wallet to get to the other one.

When I scanned it, the light again turned red. "Let me see that," the security officer asked, then shook his head. "Ma'am, we don't have a terminal C at this airport. Your ticket is for Tampa."

I had come to the wrong airport! And my plane was scheduled to depart in less than 30 minutes! Tampa International Airport is an hour away. There was no way I could make it in time.

I raced downstairs to the Southwest desk, which amazingly was clear of people.

"I can't believe I came to the wrong airport . . ."

After hearing my predicament, the agent replied, "Just this once, we'll reschedule you. You can fly to Dallas and then catch a plane from there to Denver."

The only problem? I was supposed to arrive at 7:45 p.m. and get a ride with the regional leaders as they drove from Colorado Springs to Ft. Collins. My new flight wasn't scheduled to arrive until 11 p.m.

I remembered I have a friend on staff who lives near the airport, and she planned to drive to Ft. Collins the next morning. When I texted her, she said I was welcome to stay at her home and drive up with her in the morning, but I needed to find a way to get to her house.

The thought of taking an Uber at 11 pm at night and getting into the car with a stranger did not appeal to me. But I didn't have any other option, so reluctantly, I went to the Uber app to schedule a pickup. When I typed in what I needed, up popped the message, "No rides available" in Denver at 11 pm. I groaned.

Boarding the flight to Dallas, my mind raced, my stomach churned. What could I do?

As I buckled my seat belt, I sensed the Lord gently ask, "Daughter, whose job is it to provide for you?"

I exhaled, "Yours, Lord."

Peace flooded in.

When I exited the plane in Dallas, I noticed a mobile column listing upcoming Southwest flights. I'd never seen them do that before. When I looked to discover the gate for my next flight, I saw there were two flights listed to Denver. One of the flights, two gates over, was getting ready to depart in three minutes!

I raced to the counter, "Is there any way I can get on this earlier flight?"

The plane was packed, but one seat remained unclaimed. The Southwest agent gave it to me!

While boarding, I asked the woman in front of me, "What time does this flight arrive in Denver?"

She replied: "7:45"— the exact time I was originally scheduled to arrive.

When I looked at the boarding pass, I discovered I only made that flight because it had been delayed by six minutes!

Did the Father ever take care of this daughter! I felt so loved!

TACKLE N' TRUST

CHAPTER 1

God's Promise of Salvation John 1:12-13

To all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God who were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God.

John 1:12-13

This is such a foundational promise! Because the promises of God were made to the children of God.

If I say, "I'm going to bring a cake for Jean next week," would you expect me to bring one for you? Not if you aren't, Jean!

In the same way, there are a lot of promises in Scripture given to specific individuals. At Christmas, we remember the angel saying to Mary, "You will conceive and give birth to a son." This is a promise to Mary. Sometimes, the Lord impresses on someone's heart, "This verse is true for you, too. I'm giving this to you as a promise." But everyone struggling with infertility can't claim this promise as being for them. The Lord specifically gave this promise to Mary, the mother of Jesus.

There are specific promises and general promises. We'll be looking at general promises: those promises God makes to every single person who is His child. But before you start claiming these promises, it's important to clarify: Are you God's child? According to this verse, if you have received Jesus and believed in His name, He has given you the right to become His child.

Your right to all the rest of the promises God made to His children rests on the reality of this one.



TACKLE!

1. Memorize this verse!

Pray! Ask the Lord to help you memorize this verse for life!

I like to start by writing the verse on a 3X5 card as pictured on the preceding page.

As you learn a verse, it is essential to quote the topic and reference at the beginning and then repeat the reference at the end. That way, when someone is helping you review, they can give you the topic without giving the location or first part of the verse away. State the reference twice because it is generally the hardest to recall.

Memorize one phrase at a time, adding to this bit by bit as you get each new addition down. For example, start with "God's Promise of Salvation, John 1:12." (When I am learning a verse with someone, we go back and forth using what we've written on the index card to check each other.) Then add the first phrase: "God's Promise of Salvation, John 1:12, **But to all who did receive him.**"

As soon as we can both state the topic, reference, and first phrase word-perfect, we add another phrase, again taking turns saying it. "God's Promise of Salvation, John 1:12 But to all who did receive him, **who believed in his name.**" Don't add more until you have that down solid!

Repeat this process until you've memorized the entire verse.

If you're having trouble, get creative! You can use hand motions or even draw pictures. One friend told me she couldn't memorize. I made up a song, putting the verse to music on the spot. (You better believe I was asking the Lord for help!) She not only learned it, she went home and taught it to her younger sister!

Now here's the most crucial thing to remember: Though you can quote the entire verse, you don't yet have it memorized! That doesn't happen until you've quoted it out loud word-perfect 100 times! I make a grid on the back of my card with columns for each day in the next week, leaving room to check off, quoting it ten to fifteen times daily. Yes, it requires intentionality to do this! But is it ever worth the effort to invest in memorizing it well. It will be with you for the rest of your life! And don't forget, you can have fun asking

random people, even in the checkout line at the grocery store, to listen to you quote your verse. You never know how the Lord might use His Word!

NOTE: In the book of John the Greek word for *believe* $\pi \iota \sigma \tau \epsilon \iota \omega$ is used 98 times — and only appears as a verb. Believing is not something you just do mentally; it impacts how you act.

"He gave the right to become children of God..."

According to this verse, what does God give? What does this mean?

Were you adopted, or do you know someone who was? What do you know about this process? How does this help you understand what it means to be given the "right" to be God's child?

Read the following verses and consider, how does this reality impact your relationship to God's promises?

What do you learn about God from this verse?

The phrase "born of God" occurs frequently in 1 John, a book in which John states, "I write these things to you who believe in the name of the son of God so that you might know that you have eternal life." According to John, what can help us **know** we have eternal life? What evidence do you see of each of these in your life?

1 John 2:29 If you know that He is absolutely righteous, you know [for certain] that everyone who practices righteousness [doing what is right and conforming to God's will] has been born of Him.

1 John 3:9 No one who is born of God [deliberately, knowingly, and habitually] practices sin, because God's seed [His principle of life, the essence of His righteous character] remains [permanently] in him [who is born again—who is reborn from above—spiritually transformed, renewed, and set apart for His purpose]; and he [who is born again] cannot habitually [live a life characterized by] sin, because he is born of God and longs to please Him.

1 John 4:7 Beloved, let us [unselfishly] love *and* seek the best for one another, for love is from God; and everyone who loves [others] is born of God and knows God [through personal experience].

1 John 5:1 Everyone who believes [with a deep, abiding trust in the fact] that Jesus is the Christ (the Messiah, the Anointed) is born of God [that is, reborn from above—spiritually transformed, renewed, and set apart for His purpose], and everyone who loves the Father also loves the *child* born of Him.

1 John 5:3-5 For the [true] love of God is this: that we habitually keep His commandments and remain focused on His precepts. And His commandments and His precepts are not difficult [to obey]. For everyone born of God is victorious and overcomes the world; and this is the victory that has conquered and overcome the world—our [continuing, persistent] faith [in Jesus the Son of God]. Who is the one who is victorious and overcomes the world? It is the one who believes and recognizes the fact that Jesus is the Son of God.

1 John 5:18 We know [with confidence] that anyone born of God does not *habitually* sin; but He (Jesus) who was born of God [carefully] keeps *and* protects him, and the evil one does not touch him.



TRUST!

What difference can it make in your life to know you are a child of God, and because of this, God has given you a bunch of promises so you can know Him experientially and become more like Him, and escape the corruption in the world caused by evil desires?

What does God want you to do in response to this?

(Note: This doesn't have to be a big, fancy application. It can even be thanking Him for what He's done in your life. But wise is the person who takes time to actively respond after reading God's Word! Check out Matthew 7:24-27 to see what a HUGE difference this can make in your life!)

PROMISE BASED LIVING

(A true story!)

As a new student leader on her campus, Elaine was excited. She couldn't wait to head out and meet freshmen, to share with them the good news of Jesus, and invite them to Navs. True, there were a few butterflies in her stomach. What if someone asked her something she didn't know? Or reacted negatively? But she'd been practicing the Bridge illustration with friends for the past few days. Might as well dive in the deep end right away!

Elaine loved being part of the Navigators. She hadn't known anyone when she'd come to college two years prior. One night, she heard people singing in the student center. The song sounded familiar, so she decided to poke her head in. That night, she'd found her tribe.

Having grown up in a Christian home, she was delighted to connect with a community so quickly. She couldn't wait to bless other students the way she'd been blessed.

When she saw a young girl heading her way, Elaine called out, "Hi! Would you be interested in taking a spiritual interest survey and being entered into a drawing to win Chick-fil-A for a year?" When the student agreed, Elaine went through the questions and then asked if she'd like to see a brief illustration summarizing the main message of the Bible. When the student nodded, Elaine dove in... and Elaine's life was never the same!

As Elaine shared the Bridge illustration with this student, she realized for the first time she'd never received Jesus' gift of salvation herself! With each verse she quoted to the freshman, she became increasingly aware that the Holy Spirit was speaking those same words in her heart, inviting her to respond to Jesus.

She'd known a lot about Jesus but never come to know him personally. As she shared, the gospel blinders were suddenly removed from her eyes! When Elaine prayed with this freshman to receive Christ, she was praying along with her, surrendering herself. That day, Elaine became a new creation in Christ while sharing the gospel with another student.

Elaine shared with me later, "I'd intellectually agreed with facts about Jesus and thought that was what being a Christian was all about, but it wasn't until that moment I realized I'd never welcomed and submitted to him in a personal relationship! I could talk the talk with the best of them! I knew the Christian lingo. But then Jesus offered Himself to me, and it wasn't until I welcomed him into my life that everything changed. I became a child of God!"

CREATIVE REVIEW

One fun way to review your verse is to write it out beautifully. Veteran Navigator Staff Debbie Friley shares one way to do this below. You can write over the top of what she's done or grab some tracing paper and have fun learning a bit of calligraphy as you review.

TIME IN GOD'S WORD

A Heart That Belongs

JOHN 1:12-13

Read the following verses, which focus on different aspects of being a child of God. Underline anything that stands out to you:

That was the true light which shines upon every man as he comes into the world. He came into the world—the world he had created—and the world failed to recognise him. He came into his own creation, and his own people would not accept him. Yet wherever men did accept him he gave them the power to become sons of God. These were the men who truly believed in him, and their birth depended not on the course of nature nor on any impulse or plan of man, but on God. John 1:9-13 (Phillips)

MEMORIZING FOR LIFE

When do you have a verse memorized? It's not when you can quote it!

There is short-term memory and long-term memory. You can memorize something short-term in just a few minutes – and forget it just as easily! But for a verse to truly be memorized long-term you need to have quoted it word perfect 70 times! Three times a day for a month will just about get you there!

And you are much more likely to remember something that is significant to you.

This is why I love to memorize verses with those I meet with. I have found getting off to a good start can really help someone succeed in developing this discipline.

- 1. When the Lord lays it on my heart to have someone memorize a verse, we start our time together praying, asking the Lord to help us not only memorize the verse but also understand it and give us wisdom to know how it can make a difference in our life.
- 2. Next we read through the verse in context and then break it into phrases. You can have so much fun with this bring colored pens and have them create word art on a 3×5 card. It's amazing when you create a visual like this how it can help start you remembering.
- 3. Then we tackle memorizing the first phrase. We go back and forth repeating it to each other, taking turns being the reviewer and note when you are serving as reviewer make sure you are looking at your card so you're certain you're memorizing the right words. In the midst of repeating one can easily make mistakes!!! (Even when the verse has been memorized for over thirty years! ;0)

If someone struggles with memorizing, I will ask the Lord to give creative ideas – either a rhythm or a song or sometimes we'll use sign language. It's amazing how helpful this can be! With one student, a dancer, she found choreographing the verse really helped her. Did she ever get a great workout reviewing! :0)

- 4. Only after she has quoted the first phrase word perfect a couple times, will we move onto the next phrase. We'll seek to learn that second phrase then add it onto the first phrase and keep going back and forth saying those two phrases together. Hearing and saying are both helpful but again, when you are reviewing make sure you're looking at the card!!!
- 5. If she's a kinesthetic learner we may even move around learning each phrase in a different place (this is really helpful with kids! But you'd be surprised at how even college students love this!) You need to be thorough, but you don't want it to be boring.

- 7. So you keep adding on one phrase at a time, not stopping until the whole verse can be quoted word perfect.
- 8. Then we go back to the first phrase and start asking questions about it. The goal here is to really understand what the verse says... and what it doesn't!

For example, when memorizing John 16:24, "Until now you have not asked for anything in my name, ask and you will receive, and your joy will be complete" For that middle phrase I'll ask, "Receive what?" And how would it be different if the verse read, "and you will receive what you ask for?" "So what is the Lord promising here?!"

9. And I'll share different cross references that can help us understand this part of the verse even more. For example, James 1:17 states "Every good and perfect gift comes from above..."

It's vital she understands that God is the giver of good gifts. Yet we don't always know what's good. So there's a real safety in this. God promises whenever we ask, we will receive... something! And because He is good, it will be good! But if we ask for something that's not good, we'll still receive – you never leave the Lord empty handed! – but because He loves us and protects us it may not be what we ask for. But whatever it is will bring us joy!

- 10. Each time we move to the next phrase I'll have her review me saying the whole verse and then review her saying it. By the time our one on one is finished, she is off to a good start towards quoting that verse 100 times!
- 11. The most important part of our time comes at the end when we each determine how we can apply the verse in our life during the coming week. This is so critical! Because once someone starts experiencing first hand the value of this verse lived out, that's one of the strongest motivators for memorizing scripture ever!

This is why I don't start with a lengthy discussion of why she should memorize, instead we dive in and let her discover this for herself!

12. And we always start our time the next week sharing what happened as a result of our application!

So there are two assignments I give whenever I do this with someone – one is to do the application she's come up with. The other is to keep reviewing the verse.

But it's vital neither assignment be vague. (check out the previous post on how to make your assignments SMART) Remember the goal is to review it 100 times so it's lodged in her long term memory! No one makes that goal without intentionality! So I ask her to review her verse three times a day every day and we create boxes! :0) You can do this on an index card or an iphone! Work with her to determine what will work for her. And I really encourage you to do it with her!

Scripture memory is one of those things that seems so easy initially ~ just memorizing a verse, especially a short verse isn't that difficult ~ but remembering it for life takes much more

intentionality and effort! Yet I have found over and over the effort is so worth it! Because when applied, when you live out what you're memorizing, it really does add life to your life because you don't just know in your head that God's Word is more precious than silver, you've experienced the incredible value of it first hand!

CHAPTER 2

God's Promise of Answered Prayer John 16:24

Until now you have asked nothing in my name. Ask, and you will receive, that your joy may be full.

John 16:24

Want more joy in your life? Then this is the promise for you! Here, Jesus is making the most astounding promise ever! "Ask, and you will receive, that your joy may be full." He didn't have to do this. He never had to promise this. But he does! Do you realize God wants you to have joy in your life? And not just a little joy . . . He want to live a life *full* of joy! And through this promise, He is making it possible.

But this verse illustrates how vital it is to know what God is promising and what He isn't.

Does this verse mean if I ask for a Porsche, I'll get one?!

If we misunderstand what God has promised it can negatively impact our trust of Him in a big way. This is why it's so important we not only know the promise but understand it.

Also, it's important to note this is a conditional promise. Some promises God makes (like Hebrews 13:5, "I will never leave you or forsake you") are always true, regardless of what we do or don't do. But this one is conditional because it requires us to do something to experience it - we need to ask!

If I do this: Then God will do this: And this will happen:

Ask -> you will receive -> joy to the full!

Ready to dive into this treasure?!



TACKLE!

1. Memorize this verse!

Write the verse down on a 3" x 5" card with the topic, reference, verse, and then the reference again.

Pray! Ask the Lord to help you memorize this verse for life.

Memorize it a phrase at a time. It may seem silly to do this, but remember the story of the tortoise and the hare? Slow and steady wins the race! Each time you repeat the verse, it makes an impression in your brain. Think of being at the beach and drawing a circle in the sand. Every time you go over the circle, the impression gets deeper.

This is why it's so critical that you quote a verse word perfectly every time. If you didn't, it would be like making a different circle in the sand that deviates from the original. That doesn't make the impression go deeper; it creates another circle!

So be sure to take your time. Don't move on to add another phrase until you can quote the previous part word-perfect at least a couple of times!



This week's goal: quote John 16:24 word perfect 100 times, and review John 1:12-13 once a day too.

2. Seek to understand this verse!

"Until now"

Why hadn't they done this before? Read John 16:1-24 and consider this verse in its context. Why do you think Jesus is saying this now?

"you have asked nothing in my name."

What does it mean to ask for something in Jesus' name? Why is this important?

The Check Analogy

Let's say I wrote you a check but I didn't sign it. Would you be able to cash it without my signature?

"Ask, and you will receive,"

What does God specifically promise here? Does it say, ask and you will receive exactly what you ask for?

How might the following two passages shed light on what God will give us?

James 1:17 Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change.

According to these verses, what kind of gifts does God give?

Matthew 7:7 "Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you. 8 For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened. 9 Or which one of you, if his son asks him for bread, will give him a stone? 10 Or if he asks for a fish, will give him a serpent? 11 If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those who ask him!

What happens if you ask for something that looks good, but God knows it won't be good for you?

There are three ways God answers when we ask:

- 1. Yes!
- 2. Wait. (Note the verse doesn't say "receive right away."

 Timing can be critical in whether something is good or not.)
- 3. I have something better for you!

There is enormous protection built into this verse. Would you want God to give you what you ask for if it wasn't good for you?

But there's another huge blessing, too. Through this verse, God reveals that we never come away empty-handed when we ask Him for something. He won't give us what we ask for if it isn't good--but He will give us something good every time we ask!

How incredible is that? What thoughts come to mind as you consider this?

"that your joy may be full."

So you ask and then receive something good. How might you experience joy as a result?

Remember how God's promises are so vital for us to experience Him? How might the following verse shed light on this?

You make known to me the path of life; in your presence there is fullness of joy; at your right hand are pleasures forevermore.

Psalm 16:11



TRUST!

What difference can it make to know that God has promised to give you something good every time you ask Him for something?

What difference can it make to know you never have to worry about asking for the wrong thing? Because if what you ask for isn't good, the Lord won't give it to you; instead, He will give you something else that genuinely is good.

What do you sense the Lord wants you to do in response to this?

(Remember, when you act on God's promises, practically applying them in your life, you not only get to experience the promise being fulfilled, but even better, you have the opportunity to experientially get to know God better as the Faithful One and grow in trusting Him and experience the benefits in 2 Peter 1: 4! So how can you practically take God up on His promise in John 16:24?)

Seek to Make Your Application SMART

S = Specific. (What specifically do you sense the Lord leading you to do?)

M = Measurable (How will you know whether you've done it or not?)

A = Accountable (Is there someone you could ask to encourage you by inquiring how you're doing on your application? I find this a HUGE help!)

R = Realistic (E.g., don't try to memorize a whole chapter in one day! Slow and steady wins the race.)

T = Timely (Don't select something you'll do far in the future. One of my friends suggests starting with something you can do in five minutes, and within the next 24 hours.)

PROMISE BASED LIVING

(A true story!)

One day, while walking with my friend Keziah, she handed me a crumpled piece of paper. Scratched in the middle were the words, "I don't know if I can trust God anymore." With tears streaming down her face, she whispered, "I can't bear to say it, but...". She sighed. "I don't know what to do."

We met thirty years prior when Keziah was a senior in high school. She had recently entered into a personal relationship with Jesus and wanted to share him with everyone she met! I'd just returned from Urbana, Illinois, where I had attended a week-long mission conference. She'd come to my house to spend the night with my sister. We stayed up half the night talking.

Keziah shared she was planning to attend a Christian college, but when she heard about the Navigators, she decided to join me at the University of Florida. Throughout college, her love and excitement for Jesus were infectious!

After graduating, she landed her dream job, working for a major relief organization, traveling the world, writing million-dollar grants, then creating and evaluating programs to help impoverished moms and their children. The brokenness, suffering, and desolation she witnessed during the next few decades began to wear and overwhelm her. Going from one grant to the next, without taking time to process, took a deadly toll on her heart and her relationship with God.

Her work "for God" crowded out her being with God. While tackling malnourishment problems in third-world countries, she'd become "spiritually malnourished" and felt distant from the Lord.

So we began to meet for tea each week, enjoying time together in God's Word. One day, after sharing God's Promise of Answered Prayer in John 16:24, I showed her my prayer cards. I love to walk and pray, flipping through verses and requests, lifting them before God's throne.

Keziah went home that day and created a prayer stack, putting a hole in the corner of each 3X5 card and holding it together with a silver ring. As she began to pray through these requests, the answers to prayer she was getting to record were incredible! As she did this, her trust in God began to grow.

One day, as we talked, she shared, "I think God is leading me to quit my job...". This is a job she dearly loves! When I asked what she was afraid of, she shared, "Not having enough money for my kids' college." I challenged her to put that on her prayer card. She did, then quit her job.

Want to guess whose kids both received full scholarships to college?


In the past eight years, Keziah's accumulated quite a few sets of prayer cards, all filled with answers to prayer (my hearing being restored was one of these!). And she continues to pass on to others what's helped her relationship with the Lord return to one of robust health!

Best of all, she now confidently declares her trust in the Lord, and is her joy ever being made full!

TIME IN GOD'S WORD

Week 3: A Heart That Responds ~ Consider The Context

FOC US: JOHN 16:12-24

"I still have many things to tell you, but you can't handle them now. But when the Friend comes, the Spirit of the Truth, he will take you by the hand and guide you into all the truth there is. He won't draw attention to himself, but will make sense out of what is about to happen and, indeed, out of all that I have done and said. He will honor me; he will take from me and deliver it to you. Everything the Father has is also mine. That is why I've said, 'He takes from me and delivers to you.'

"In a day or so you're not going to see me, but then in another day or so you will see me." That stirred up a hornet's nest of questions

among the disciples: "What's he talking about: 'In a day or so you're not going to see me, but then in another day or so you will see me'? And, 'Because I'm on my way to the Father'? What is this 'day or so'? We don't know what he's talking about."

Jesus knew they were dying to ask him what he meant, so he said, "Are you trying to figure out among yourselves what I meant when I said, 'In a day or so you're not going to see me, but then in another day or so you will see me'? Then fix this firmly in your minds: You're going to be in deep mourning while the godless world throws a party. You'll be sad, very sad, but your sadness will develop into gladness.

"When a woman gives birth, she has a hard time, there's no getting around it. But when the baby is born, there is joy in the birth. This new life in the world wipes out memory of the pain. The sadness you have right now is similar to that pain, but the coming joy is also similar. When I see you again, you'll be full of joy, and it will be a joy no one can rob from you. You'll no longer be so full of questions.

"This is what I want you to do: Ask the Father for whatever is in keeping with the things I've revealed to you. Ask in my name, according to my will, and he'll most certainly give it to you. Your joy will be a river overflowing its banks! John 16:12-24 (MSG)

KEEP IT SIMPLE, SWEETIE

There is not only one way to enjoy a quiet time or do scripture memory or pray or spend extended time alone with the Lord. Different methods work for different people at different times.

However, when you are first teaching someone how to do something, it is wise to show them one way. Later on, you can teach them alternative methods or tweak what you showed them to better suit their personality and preferences.

But if you try to show more than one method at a time, this can add confusion, and what you've intended to help can end up being a hindrance as they then have to choose what to start with before they even start.

As they say with the old acronym KISS: Keep it simple, sweetie!

How do you select which method to start with?

I usually begin passing on what's worked best for me. I'm sharing what's impacted me and helped me the most. Whether it's what will ultimately work best for them or not, I am letting them see more of my walk with Jesus – and that is so important.

But there are exceptions to starting this way– especially if someone struggles with a handicap.

Once, my husband was meeting with a guy who seemed eager to get together and grow, but whenever Jim would challenge him to read something, even the Bible, on his own, he never did. It was perplexing.

Then we learned he had an extreme case of dyslexia and couldn't read. This required adjustments. Once that came to light, Jim encouraged him to listen to the Word. What a difference that made.

Don't follow a set plan, follow Jesus.

It also helps if the first method you teach is well-organized and easy to remember. Not only does this help her know how to do it the next day when she is on her own, but she is more likely to pass on something simple.

For example, when I teach women how to enjoy a quiet time I follow the outline: Look, Listen, Live It Out (you can read more about this in the Helps section). It's not that this is the only way, but it's what I've been doing for thirty years and benefiting greatly from! Plus, it's simple and easy to remember and still covers the three key parts I have found so vital for being transformed by my time with Jesus – focusing, meditating, and application.

Over and over I am amazed at how many women, after just sharing one quiet time with me turn around and do this with someone else! I truly have found the more simple, organized and memorable something is the more likely it is to be passed on. This is key for discipling generationally!!!

And please note, keeping it simple, isn't just of value when you are meeting one on one with someone – if you are ever asked to give a workshop, keep it simple! I can't tell you how many times I've met with students after they've attended introductory workshops on a spiritual discipline and they never got around to doing it because they were immobilized by all the options.

Instead, whether you're doing a workshop or showing a woman one on one take time to do the discipline together! Don't just tell how to do something! Model it and let it be experienced... and be amazed at how much more likely people are to do this on their own after actually doing it with you!

And, if possible, don't just do it with her once. We live in an information based society – where we're always seeking something new. And it's easy when discipling to think – I've showed her once, now let's move onto the next topic. Remember it takes six weeks for something to become a habit. Since the goal isn't for her to know about spiritual disciplines, but to do them so she can be transformed as the Lord works through them, you have to take this into account!

It is not uncommon for me to dedicate at least six weeks (if not double!) focusing on one spiritual discipline. Yep! All we focus on week after week is doing that one discipline together, helping her not just learn how to do it, but giving opportunity for it to be incorporated into her life.

For this to happen there not only needs to be repetition, she also needs time to experience the life changing benefit of doing this so she'll be motivated to keep doing it even after we've moved on to something else – or when I'm no longer around!

So keep it simple, sweetie! This simple principle really can help you – and those you're meeting with get off to a good start!

CHAPTER 3

God's Promise of Help in Temptation 1 Corinthians 10:13

No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it.

1 Corinthians 10:13

Here is one of the promises I turn to most often. Memorize this verse, and do you ever get bang for your buck - - it contains not just one but two promises!

This is an example of a promise that is always true whether you take God up on His offer or not. It is based on His faithfulness and His incredible love for us.


Do you remember the armor of God described in Ephesians 6? Claiming this promise in 1 Corinthians 10:13 is one key way to use the Sword of the Spirit--the Word of God--to help defend yourself in the heat of spiritual warfare. And since we have an enemy prowling around like a roaring lion looking to see who He can devour (1 Peter 5:8), we have many opportunities to experience God through these promises!

The enemy is so sneaky--he loves to make us feel no one has ever struggled as much as us and then whisper, "Go on, just do it. You know you're going to give in eventually. . "

Now imagine being in the midst of a battle with such a formidable foe and having to say, "Wait. Hold on there, just a minute. I need to find my Bible and that promise that can help me." Do you think Satan honors timeouts?

That's why memorizing these promises is so crucial to being able to use them. When they are stored in your brain and embraced in your heart, they are available for the Holy Spirit to bring to mind right when you need them . . . and help you be victorious! Ready to tackle this one?





Pray! Ask the Lord to help you memorize for life! This isn't a rote exercise.

Scripture Memory is one of the most difficult spiritual disciplines to do effectively, so it makes perfect sense to ask the Lord to make His grace abound so you can memorize this verse well.

And remember how important this verse can be to help you in spiritual warfare? It should come as no surprise that the enemy does *not* want you memorizing this verse. He will do all he can to distract, sidetrack, or thwart you. Never forget that you are in a battle that rages 24/7. What a blessing it is to know that greater is He who is in you than he who is in the world (1 John 4:4)!

Remember to take your time and learn the verse phrase by phrase. When I do this while meeting one-on-one with someone, we start our time here and don't stop until we both quote the verse word perfectly. This gets them off to a solid start and is a helpful review for me.

Don't forget to create a grid on the back of your cards to help you review the verse 15 times each day until you've quoted it word perfectly aloud to someone 70 to 100 times. And please note that doing this aloud to someone is essential. It's so easy to think, I'll quote it in my head and that should be enough. But, sadly, it isn't. Repeating it aloud to someone each of those 100 times helps your brain to store it better.

2. Seek to Understand the verse

"No temptation has overtaken you"
What is temptation?

The Greek word translated *temptation here*, πειρασμὸς, refers to an experiment, attempt, trial, or proving. It can refer to an enticement to sin from either internal desires or external circumstances, or it can refer to adversity, affliction, or trouble sent by God to test or prove one's character, faith, or holiness. In James 1:13 we are clearly told God never tempts anyone but He does allow trials to give us opportunity to grow.

What are some temptations you struggle with?

How many of them does this verse apply to?

"except what is common to man"

According to this verse, are you the only one facing this struggle?

"God iş faithful"

What does this mean? When you think of God being faithful, what comes to mind?

What difference can knowing this make in your life?

One of my favorite verses is James 1:17:

"Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows." (NIV)

When my son was little he started a club called "he Knowing God Better Club where each week we considered a different attribute of God. One week as we were studying this verse I grabbed a flashlight and had all the boys crowd into a dark room and shine the flashlight on me. "What happens to my shadow when I get down really low?" The boys yelled, "It gets tiny!" Then I stood up as tall as I could with my hands in the air, "What's happened to my shadow now?" and they yelled "It's super big!" And I shared, "Do you see, God isn't like my shadow. He's not down when I'm down or up when I'm up. He doesn't change like a shifting shadow! No matter what I do, He is constant--faithful in loving me and in keeping His promises. He does what He says He will do!

"and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability"

Here is the first promise! What do you learn here?

What would your life be like if God didn't do this?

How can knowing this help you when you are tempted?

NOTE: If you ever want to "see" this promise in action, go read the first couple chapters of Job. Can the enemy do anything he wants to Job? What do you notice about God here?

"but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape,"

Here's the second promise! What has God promised to do for you when you are tempted?

Can you think of a time when God did this for you?

"that you may be able to endure it."

Why does God provide this way of escape?

Why do you think it says "that you may" rather than "that you will?" (NOTE: This is important for noting what God has and hasn't promised! You have a part to play here, don't you? What is your part?)

How can knowing this promise help you when	you are being tempted?
Even more than helping you when you are tempted, how can knowing this verse help you to personally experience God being faithful?	One thing I absolutely love about this promise - even if I blow it, even if I don't take the way out God provides, if I still look back and identify the way out he provided (that knock at the door or phone call, etc) I still have experienced Him being faithful to do what He said He'd do! Even in my failure I can grow in trusting Him!



TRUST!

What difference can it make in your life to know that:

...You aren't the only one struggling with this temptation?

....God won't let you be tempted beyond what you can bear?

...When you are tempted God will provide a way out so you can endure it?

PROMISE BASED LIVING

(A true story!)

After kayaking for four glorious hours exploring all the inlets along the Braden River, enjoying sweet time with Jesus singing His praises while memorizing His word, I noticed a street that looked familiar. Pulling out my phone to take a picture so I could check it when driving home, I saw a text I'd been waiting for had come in.

For four years, I'd helped train all new incoming staff. A change in leadership occurred that year, and I'd been warned things might change. I was waiting to hear whether I needed to book a flight to Colorado.

The last time I'd been out there, I'd been recruited to handle a difficult situation. After the Lord abundantly blessed I was asked if I'd be willing to keep helping, so I expected my involvement would continue. Months passed, and I didn't hear anything, so I decided to take the initiative to ask if my help was still wanted.

In the text, I learned it wasn't. I was surprised. But deep peace flooded my heart as I looked up, reminded of I Corinthians 10:13. "You're protecting me from being tempted beyond what I can bear, aren't you?!"

In truth, the last time I'd done this training, I'd thought, "Usually, the Lord doesn't have me do the same thing twice, and it's now been four years, four times presenting the same introductory workshops at the summit." God created me to be an activator, to get new things started, not to be an expert or trainer who does the same thing repeatedly.

In truth, I probably would've kept doing the four-hour workshops year after year because I believed they were so strategic. I loved the opportunity to help new staff women understand the gospel in deeper, creative, heart-level ways and discover and embrace their identity in Jesus. It was pure joy seeing them also discover the wisdom of God in how He so wonderfully made them!

But as I kayaked home, the Lord reminded me, "Nothing can thwart my purposes. When I want you to do something, no one can take it from you. The only reason they have is because I have something else for you to do!"

I so appreciated how the Lord provided a way out from being frustrated, even bitter, over how this was handled, as He first prepared my heart to hear this news after I'd enjoyed sweet time with Him, and He also gave me a new beautiful perspective!

He is so faithful to keep His promises! And 1 Corinthians 10:13 is one I experience Him being faithful to do almost daily! I am so thankful!

TIME IN GOD'S WORD

Week 4: A Heart For Battle ~ Consider the Context

1 CORINTHIANS 10: 1-14

Remember our history, friends, and be warned. All our ancestors were led by the providential Cloud and taken miraculously through the Sea. They went through the waters, in a baptism like ours, as Moses led them from enslaving death to salvation life. They all ate and drank identical food and drink, meals provided daily by God. They drank from the Rock, God's fountain for them that stayed with them wherever they were. And the Rock was Christ. But just experiencing God's wonder and grace didn't seem to mean much—most of them were defeated by temptation during the hard times in the desert, and God was not pleased.

The same thing could happen to us. We must be on guard so that we never get caught up in wanting our own way as they did. And we must not turn our religion into a circus as they did—"First the people partied, then they threw a dance." We must not be sexually promiscuous—they paid for that, remember, with 23,000 deaths in one day! We must never try to get Christ to serve us instead of us serving him; they tried it, and God launched an epidemic of poisonous snakes. We must be careful not to stir up discontent; discontent destroyed them.

These are all warning markers—danger!— in our history books, written down so that we don't repeat their mistakes. Our positions in the story are parallel—they at the beginning, we at the end—and we are just as capable of messing it up as they were. Don't be so naive and self-confident. You're not exempt. You could fall flat on your face as easily as anyone else. Forget about self-confidence; it's useless. Cultivate God-confidence.

No test or temptation that comes your way is beyond the course of what others have had to face. All you need to remember is that God will never let you down; he'll never let you be pushed past your limit; he'll always be there to help you come through it.

So, my very dear friends, when you see people reducing God to something they can use or control, get out of their company as fast as you can.

1 Corinthians 10: 1-14 (MSG)


A DISCIPLE-MAKING CONTINUUM

FLEXIBILITY VS. STRUCTURE

There is not one way to disciple. This is true not only because each person being discipled is unique, but also because every discipler is unique!

Personality, maturity, past experiences, convictions, spiritual gifting... there are so many factors that impact the way we do what we do.

Some disciplers are super structured. They know what they want to accomplish and have a clear plan for how to get there. Others are extremely flexible, highly relational, ready and willing to go with the flow. In between there's a range of possibilities!



This reality can be expressed by a continuum which features on the left "extreme flexibility," (aka "Let's just get together and talk...") and on the right "extreme structure" (aka "This is THE plan!").

There are strengths and weaknesses to both.

Consider the following: At one extreme we have Flexible Felicity. Her focus is primarily on building relationship. She tends to see disciple-making as an art, with each encounter a new creative opportunity. Her strengths can be her focus on the person, who usually feels very loved and cared for, and her flexibility may result in deep needs being met that might otherwise be missed which she intuitively may be more likely to pick up on (though this doesn't always happen!). A key weakness is she can easily be sidetracked and miss the goal. Her greatest danger is to lose sight of the goal and end up spinning her wheels, perhaps even wasting the time. When this happens does the enemy ever rejoice!

At the other extreme we find Structured Susan. Her focus is on reaching the goal. She views disciple-making as a science (most likely one she's got down pat! and is very eager to help others learn to "do right"). Her strengths are her ability to clearly articulate her goals at all times for this is primarily what she's focusing on. What she does in her one on ones tends to be easier to duplicate, since the more organized something is the more easily it lends itself to passing on, and what she does with people is usually measurable (ie, she knows when her plans are accomplished...at least her part of doing it!). A key weakness is this can be impersonal and with such a heavy focus on a predetermined plan, important needs can easily be missed and people can end up feeling like a project. The key danger here is losing the relationship! When this happens does the enemy ever score a huge victory.

In Ecclesiastes 7:18 we're told, "It is good to grasp the one and not let go of the other. The man who fears God will avoid all extremes." Have I ever found this to be wise advice. There can be great beauty and strength in balance! For example, it's vital to love well (see 1 Cor 13:1-3!), people really do grow best in the context of relationship, and to realize you are meeting with a unique individual who has unique needs, but also to understand being intentional can be a huge part of loving well. How do you feel when someone puts effort into preparing something for you?!

My favorite part is what happens to our focus as we struggle to stay more balanced – rather than focusing primarily on the person or on the goal, I find the struggle tends to help me keep my focus primarily on God!

Can it ever help to pray through this continuum and consider where you fall on it:

Where does your personality naturally place you?

How have your past experiences influenced this, especially if you were discipled, what did that look like?

What impact has your spiritual maturity had on this? Have you changed through the years?

Are there any convictions influencing what you do?

And how does your gifting influence this?

For example, I'm a fairly flexible, intuitive, highly creative and highly distractible person who LOVES people!!! So on the basis of personality alone, it's obvious I'm more likely to fall on the left of the continuum. BUT I was discipled by a woman who was structured and had a plan so that provides balance! Since what was modeled for me was more on the right side, I've experienced the benefits of that side too.

Because I've been discipling women for over thirty years I have a lot of tools available to use that are internalized, so if an opportunity to meet one on one with someone pops up unexpectedly I don't need as much advance planning as I did when I was first learning how to do this. Though without a doubt the first tool I always seek to use is prayer, because I realize no matter how much experience I have, God's ways still aren't my ways and I so want to walk in step with Him! (that's a conviction that's resulted in a set plan to pray first!)

Over the years I've seen one of the best ways I can help women is to faithfully spend time in the Word with them each time we meet. With all my heart (yes, this is a deep conviction!) I believe that's the most enriching I can ever do with anyone. So I intentionally plan each week to spend focused time together in the Word.

And I have a deep conviction about spiritual generations of laborers being raised up – I want what I'm passing on that's of value to be readily passed onto others. I so want each woman I'm meeting with to discover the joy of doing with others what I'm doing with her! Not only for the benefit of others – I deeply believe this is key for her finishing life well. Does that ever spur me on to be more organized so what I do is pass-on-able!

Now hospitality is one of my gifts, so I am much more likely to seek to disciple in a warm place preferably with a cup of tea and something good to eat and to spend time at the start catching up and relationally connecting! But the Lord has also given me a gift of teaching and often teaching well requires advance planning (like making certain I have two sets of colored pencils or copies of tools I'm introducing! ;0) and being aware of the time (which does NOT come naturally to me) so we have enough time to do what I believe the Lord wants us doing!

So I continue to seek to grow towards being more balanced when I'm discipling women. In all honesty, this can be a struggle! I expect I'm always going to be more on the left side due to my personality. But that's not bad! That's a big part of how the Lord made me. Maybe structure and planning come more naturally for you and you need to be more intentional about enjoying relationship with those you meet with. Either way, let's not let what comes naturally be an excuse that keeps us from growing, or from doing the best we can for the women we're discipling!

Two pens

Red Marker

Directions:

- 1. Fold the paper in half vertically in the middle
- 2. Fold the paper horizontally about an inch down from the top -
- 3. Draw lines on the creases to create two columns
- 4. Write your name at the top of one column, and Jesus' name at the top of the second column
- 5. Underneath your name write down the sin you've committed this past week. You can pray and invite God to search your hearts to bring this to mind.
- 6. Then underneath Jesus' name write Perfect obedience for 33 years
- 7. Separate the paper along each of the folds, both horizontal and vertical
- 8. On the piece of cardstock glue your name and Jesus' name at the top of the page.
- 9. Underneath Jesus' name glue the column of your sins.
- 10. Then take the red marker and write on top of it PAID IN FULL!
- 11. Underneath your name glue the column that says Perfect obedience for 33 years. Then write, "Because of Jesus"
- 12. This is what justification means, "Just as if I never sinned. Just as if I did everything right, this is how God sees me even on my worse day."

Discuss:

1. How did it feel to do this?

2. Christ died for sins once for all, but when we confess, agreeing with him what we've done is wrong we have opportunity to experience the great exchange and appreciate even more what Jesus has done for us.

Apply

- 1. Encourage her to confess her sins every day this week, taking Jesus up on his offer in 1 John 1:9
- 2. Review 1 John 1:9 ten times every day this week.
 - 1. Create a grid on the back of the scripture memory card and encourage her to record a check each time she reviews
- 3. Keep reviewing John 1:12-13, John 16:24 and 1 Corinthians 10:13 once a day this week

CHAPTER 4

God's Promise of Forgiveness 1 John 1:9

If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

1 John 1:9

Ever beat yourself up when you blow it? That is not at all what the Lord wants you to do! But does the enemy ever love it!

You see, as long as I'm beating myself up, I'm focusing on myself, not what Jesus has done for me. And because I live in a broken, fallen world and have a sinful nature that's still very much alive and kicking, I am going to blow it. As the apostle Paul says, "For I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. . . . For I have the desire to do what is right, but not the ability to carry it out (Romans 7:15,18).

What a difference it made the night I entered into a relationship with Him. I truly experienced Him cleansing me from head to toe. But it wasn't long until I sinned again. Good thing that when Jesus died on the cross, He died for *all* of my sin - even those I haven't committed yet. I still need Him every single day to save me from my sin.

When I sin, it's so easy to just feel bad and move on. But when I take time to take Him up on this promise, is there ever peace and joy as I experience Him cleansing me all over again!

Jesus says, "He who is forgiven little loves little" (Luke 7:47). The reality is we all have been forgiven much. But when we take the time to confess, we are much more likely to realize this--and grow in loving Jesus even more!



TACKLE!

1. Memorize this verse!

Pray! Ask the Lord to help you memorize this for life.

Remember, a spiritual battle is raging, and the enemy does not want you to know or remember this promise! He wants to get you beating yourself up, focusing on you rather than Jesus because he does not want you to grow in loving Jesus more - or experiencing the joy that could be yours! So don't be surprised if it's hard to memorize this one.

It's not a long verse, so you may be tempted to shortcut taking time to memorize it well. Don't! Dive in one phrase at a time, and don't move on to the next until you get it word perfect.

Remember to create a grid on the back of your card to check off each time you review. By this time, you should be reviewing your current verse ten to fifteen times a day and each of the preceding verses once a day! This is crucial to store the verses in your long-term memory. Here's what my checklist looks like.

If you devise a way of reviewing regularly, you will reap the rewards of having God's Word hidden in your heart for the rest of your life! Don't just take my word for it! Check out Psalm 119:9,11

So why confess?



God has given us everything we need for life and godliness! Can you see how this promise plays a vital role in this? Even when you blow it, God has you covered! And not just in the heavenly realms, but He's provided a way so you don't have to keep struggling with guilt and condemnation! You also have the opportunity to love Him more as you act on this promise.

What difference can knowing this make in your life? Take some time to jot down your thoughts regarding this!



I have found it helpful to end each day by praying through the acronym ACTS:

Adoration - I consider how I experienced the Lord throughout the day and praise Him.

Confession - I agree with Jesus about times I "blew it" and ask for His help to repent (which simply means to change direction so I don't keep blowing it).

Thanksgiving - When I've confessed, I can focus on Jesus and thank Him for how He willingly suffered to pay the penalty for my sin. And of course there are always a ton of other things from my day to thank Him for!

Supplication - what a difference it can make to share with Jesus the concerns on my heart. I find I sleep so much better when I cast my anxieties on Him! (1 Peter 5:7) What do you sense the Lord wants you to do in response to what you've learned from Him while working through this chapter?

PROMISE BASED LIVING

(A true story)

"When I went to college, I followed a guy I dated all through high school to the University of Florida. After my first semester, we got engaged. We had been in a physical relationship, and I would have said at the time that I was a Christian, but I wasn't walking with the Lord. I didn't know what it was to have the Lord be the Lord in my life.

In my freshman year, my roommate's brother was dating a girl, and her name was Debbie Entsminger. She asked us to run and get yogurt and hang out. So when she asked us to Bible study, I wanted to go. I wanted to learn and grow. And I did. Then, she also asked me if I wanted to memorize scripture.

At that time, as I was reading the Word, the Lord started working on my heart. I saw that I wasn't walking with the Lord and was not in his will. Then we memorized 1 John 1:9, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness."

The guy I was dating was not a Christian. And God was moving me in a different direction. He wanted me to make Him the Lord of my life. And so I hung on to that promise that I could start over, and I could be pure and righteous in the Lord's eyes, and I was forgiven. So I made that decision. I asked the Lord to forgive me. I turned away from the sin. I broke off the relationship.

Debbie challenged me not to date for a year and instead pursue God. I did, and I was growing. And I hung on to that promise. Because there were others around saying, 'We you know you. This is who you are. This is what you've done.' And I'd respond, 'No, I get to start over. The Lord said so.'

Down the road, I met a Christian guy I was so excited about. There came a day when I had to tell him about my past, which was really hard. I didn't know how he would handle it.

To my dismay, he did have a hard time. He walked away for a little while. He had to process all that. Then the lies started coming in, 'I'm dirty.' 'I am not good enough for him.' 'I'm bad, and he deserves somebody better than me.'

Then I remembered that verse, 'If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness,' and I thought, *Wait a second. He has the problem, not me. He doesn't understand forgiveness. He doesn't understand what the Lord did in my life.* And that gave me so much peace! That verse reminded me of the truth, so I didn't get down on myself with all the lies that Satan was trying to feed me at that moment.


So I told that guy, 'You have the issue if you don't see that I am forgiven and purified.' Then he did see it. He did understand it, and we have been married for thirty-three years!

It is so important to know scripture, to have it memorized so when you need it, you have it! Then the Holy Spirit can pull it up in the middle of the night when you wake up, and you're just filled with lies, or in the middle of a workday, or you're driving your car... Whenever lies pop in, you need to be able to call on Scripture to fight off Satan.

So as you're discipling others and wanting to grow, even for the sake of your own children one day, memorize scripture, have it in your mind, have it in your heart, know these promises from the Lord, so you can fight off those lies and know the truth."

TIME IN GOD'S WORD

Week 5: A Heart Forgiven ~ Consider the Context

FOCUS: MATTHEW 6:5-15, 1 JOHN 1:5-15 (MSG)

This, in essence, is the message we heard from Christ and are passing on to you: God is light, pure light; there's not a trace of darkness in him.

If we claim that we experience a shared life with him and continue to stumble around in the dark, we're obviously lying through our teeth—we're not living what we claim. But if we walk in the light, God himself being the light, we also experience a shared life with one another, as the sacrificed blood of Jesus, God's Son, purges all our sin.

If we claim that we're free of sin, we're only fooling ourselves. A claim like that is errant nonsense. On the other hand, if we admit our sins—simply come clean about them—he won't let us down; he'll be true to himself. He'll forgive our sins and purge us of all wrongdoing. If we claim that we've never sinned, we out-and-out contradict God—make a liar out of him. A claim like that only shows off our ignorance of God. 1 John 1:5-15 (MSG)

"Here's what I want you to do: Find a quiet, secluded place so you won't be tempted to role-play before God. Just be there as simply and honestly as you can manage. The focus will shift from you to God, and you will begin to sense his grace.

"The world is full of so-called prayer warriors who are prayer-ignorant. They're full of formulas and programs and advice, peddling techniques for getting what you want from God. Don't fall for that nonsense. This is your Father you are dealing with, and he knows better than you what you need. With a God like this loving you, you can pray very simply. Like this:

Our Father in heaven,
Reveal who you are.
Set the world right;
Do what's best—as above, so below.
Keep us alive with three square meals.
Keep us forgiven with you and forgiving others.
Keep us safe from ourselves and the Devil.
You're in charge! You can do anything you want!
You're ablaze in beauty! Yes. Yes.

"In prayer there is a connection between what God does and what you do. You can't get forgiveness from God, for instance, without also forgiving others. If you refuse to do your part, you cut yourself off from God's part.

Matthew 6:5-15 (MSG)

My Little Pink Book

I am a creative, spontaneous, adventure-loving person who takes great delight in being with people, loves to hear their stories, and joins in with those stories as often as I can! But when the Lord was knitting me together in my mother's womb, well, all of those organizational and scheduling neurons never got activated (or placed there in the first place!). It's like that part of my brain simply doesn't function.

My husband is the exact opposite (We are proof the Lord can hold any marriage together!) The good news is he got all those neurons I'm missing. For the past twenty-seven years he's been trying to teach me to create "homes" for things so I'm not forever losing them. And I'm happy to report I now have one... well, sort of... for my glasses. Instead of losing them all the time, we're down to about 50%. Having a home for our keys helps even more. You wouldn't believe how much time this simple organizational trick saves me. And I sure don't miss the stress and duress experienced when racing around to find them. I am learning the value of being organized.

And when it comes to discipling, I have found keeping a record of what I do with people is helpful. Not only does it keep me from the embarrassment of, "Um, I think you already shared this with me last year..." but is it ever helpful for discerning patterns where the Lord is at work in a person's life and at the end of our times together I can give the person I meet with an outline of what we did so she can refer back to this when she starts to meet with someone else to pass on what was passed on to her.

When your kids are growing up, it's easy to think, "I'll never forget this." But so often you do. If you don't take time to write things down, it really is sad all that you forget.


This is also true in discipleship.

When you begin discipling a woman, it's easy to think, "Of course, I'll remember what we've done." Or to assume she'll remember when she starts discipling someone else. This is especially true if the Lord has you discipling someone long term. I once discipled a woman for seven years (it tends to take much longer in the work world and not in a collegiate setting). There were times when I really struggled to remember if we'd covered something or not.

So here I was, organizationally challenged but seeing a serious need to keep track of what I'm doing with people. You better believe I got down on my knees crying out to the Lord for wisdom. And did he ever deliver.

He gave me the idea to get a small notebook I could keep in my purse. At the end of my one-on-ones, I stop five minutes early. I ask the person I'm meeting with to write down the key things that stood out to her from our time together. While she is writing, I am writing in my notebook recording what we just did!

Now this could take a number of different forms, but here's what I've found most helpful:



After recording the person's name and the date, I write down:

Focus: what the main focus of our time was

Verses: where we camped out in the scriptures

Assignment: what did I ask her to do before the next time we meet that gives her the opportunity to either process more or apply what we discussed.

Tools: what, if any, tools did I share with her during our time together

Future Ideas: I can't even begin to tell you how much it helps with future planning when I jot down ideas while they are fresh in my head.

Pray: Depending on how much time the person takes writing her summary from our time I will either write out a prayer then or later in the week spend time praying through what we did. And as I'm praying if the Lord gives me more ideas I'll write those down in the book too!

And let me say having the person I'm meeting with write up that summary is not just busy work for her. After she is done, I have her share with me what she wrote and wow! Can it ever be insightful to hear what stood out to her! Many times it's different from what I would've expected \sim and that too can help me better prepare \sim and pray! \sim for our next time together!

I cannot recommend highly enough doing this... especially if you're organizationally challenged like me! :0)

And yes, my little book is pink! :0) Go ahead, splurge and get one that brings you joy each time you look at it! I've found I'm much less likely to lose it if I like it! ;0)

If any of you lacks wisdom he should ask of God who gives generously to all without finding fault and it will be given to him.

James 1:5

Has this promise ever brought joy into my life!

Twenty years ago, I started praying this verse at the start of my one-on-one meetings. This took my discipling to a whole different level! I don't know what's going on in someone's heart. I don't know all that's been going on in their life, let alone how God is at work in them. But God does. Does it ever make sense to take Him up on this promise!

The results blew me away! Sometimes, the words He gave me to share made me want to take notes! I knew they did not come from me. And as I experienced the Lord doing this, it led to such joy! Now, every time I meet with someone, we first pray and ask the Lord to give us wisdom.

I don't only claim this promise for discipleship but in all of life. At fifty-nine, after walking with Jesus for forty-one of those years, I am even more aware of how much I lack wisdom: about what to say yes or no to, how to handle different situations (especially conflicts) that come up, how to apply God's Word in my daily life! Over and over, as I cry out to the Lord for wisdom, I am blown away at how He doesn't just give a little but exceedingly abundantly more than I could have asked for. What a generous giver He is!



TACKLE!

1. Memorize this verse!

Pray! Ask the Lord to help you memorize this verse for life because it has incredible potential to change your life!

Take it step by step, one phrase at a time - you never outgrow the need to do this!

And don't miss the topic! It will help you recall this verse when you need wisdom - when you wonder, "What was that verse on wisdom?!" it's so much more likely to pop up!

Be diligent to quote the reference twice, at the beginning and end of quoting the verse. This will be such a help later on, so when someone asks you where to find the verse, you aren't on the spot, stammering, "Well, somewhere in the Bible it says...!

In Psalm 119, God's word is described as being as precious as silver and as costly as gold. You want to take excellent care in how you store it!

And here's what your scripture memory review grid can look like for this week:

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This may initially seem like a lot to review daily, but consider what Psalm 1 says: "Blessed is the one . . . whose delight is in the law of the Lord and on his law he meditates day and night! That person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither—whatever they do prospers."

So the true goal isn't to recite your verse word perfectly seventy to one hundred times; that's how you start. Ultimately, the goal is to always have God's Word with you so you can meditate on it day and night and live it out!

2. Seek to understand the verse:

"If any of you lacks wisdom,"

Now, this is an interesting "if." It's not "if you do this, then I'll. . . . " So what does this "if" reveal?

How many people do you think lack wisdom? Is that true for you? If so, when are you most aware of it?

Why do you think the promise begins this way?

"you should ask God,"

What is your role in experiencing this promise?

"who gives generously to all"

What do you learn about God from this promise?

Do you think of God as a generous giver? Why or why not?
What difference can knowing this about God make in your life?
"without finding fault," What does this mean?
What picture does this give you of God's response when you come to Him because you lack wisdom?
"and it will be given to you."
So what is God promising?
Does it say, "It will be given to him sometimes?"
What difference can knowing this make in your life?



TRUST!

Can you think of situations where you lack wisdom and can take God up on His offer?

How do you think God wants you to apply this promise this week?

Sometimes I struggle to think of an application after I've spent time reading God's Word or doing Bible study. But I've realized a great application can be to ask God for the wisdom to know how and when to apply what I've just learned from Him?!

Sharing with a friend what you plan to do and asking her to pray for you, asking the Lord to bless your efforts, can make a huge difference in your life! Who could you share your application with? Write her name below and later on write what happens as a result.

PROMISE BASED LIVING

(A true story!)

"I am so tired of hard things happening! I keep giving it all I've got to overcome, and things may go fine for a bit, but then bam! Another hard thing hits. And another! And another! Why keep trying? Why not just get in my car and drive off the highway?"

I find few things in ministry as difficult and scary as sitting with a woman who has lost hope. The stakes are so high. And I often have no idea what to say. This is when I am extra thankful for Jesus' promise in James 1:5, "If any of you lacks wisdom he should ask of God who gives generously to all without finding fault and it will be done for him." This has to be my most utilized promise!

In truth, my discipling of women went to a different level when I started taking the Lord up on this promise before meeting with anyone. Over and over, I have experienced Him being faithful to provide the wisdom I need when I ask. There are times I find myself taking notes on what He gives!

So, as I sat across from this precious sister in Christ who comes from a horrendous background but who prayed with me two years ago to enter into a relationship with Jesus, you better believe I was crying out to the Lord for wisdom.

Suddenly, the thought came to mind, "Share with her about pregnancy." Okay...? I wasn't sure where this was going, but I dove in, "Lisa, without God, when hard things happen, it can feel like a bunch of horrible random events, totally out of your control. But think of pregnancy."

She looked up, surprised,

"Once labor starts, you have no control over the frequency, intensity, or duration of contractions. That first one hits, and it is off the charts painful, so you start trying to do your Lamaze breathing and endure until it ends, then you rest for a few moments, so thankful to have made it, but then the next contraction hits."

She rubbed her abdomen, "I remember."

"But these aren't random pains; each one has a purpose. The womb has to contract on the top to open on the bottom so the baby can come out. The whole purpose of Lamaze breathing is to help you relax and not fight the contraction so your body can do what it was designed to do. All that pain is a necessary part of new life coming into the world.

With God, that's true for the hard things that happen to us, too. They may feel like random, pointless problems, but God is at work in the midst of them all, producing things greater than we can ever imagine."

Lisa rubbed the back of her neck. "You think?"

"Do you know Romans 8:28?"

When Lisa shook her head, I pulled out the Message Bible. It's not the Bible I normally use, but I brought it with me because after Lisa became a Christian, I gave her a copy of this version since she'd been unfamiliar with the Bible before. I turned to Romans 8:26-28 and read, "Meanwhile, the moment we get tired in the waiting, God's Spirit is right alongside helping us along. If we don't know how or what to pray, it doesn't matter. He does our praying in and for us, making prayer out of our wordless sighs, our aching groans. He knows us far better than we know ourselves, knows our pregnant condition..."

I gasped, "I didn't know that was in there!"

"You didn't?" she asked.


"No! Oh, friend, I asked Jesus to give wisdom to help me know what to share with you! He must really want you to hear this! Listen to how the verse continues, 'He knows us far better than we know ourselves, knows our pregnant condition, and keeps us present before God. That's why we can be so sure that every detail in our lives of love for God is worked into something good."

I only wish you could've seen her smile as we parted. What an amazing God we serve!

CREATIVE REVIEW

I love this verse! Especially when I'm creatively seeking to go deeper with Jesus. I often don't know what will help His truth go from my head to my heart, so I ask the Lord to give me wisdom to know what to do. Without fail, I end up amazed as, time after time, the Lord gives ideas I never would've come up with on my own. He is such a generous God! We can ask for wisdom regarding anything!

Have fun this week by asking Him how He wants you to ponder this promise creatively. He may bring to mind one of the techniques introduced previously or something new! And remember, the goal isn't to create something museum-worthy but to enjoy a sweet time with Jesus reviewing His Word while considering it more deeply, especially how it relates to your life. Have fun!



TIME IN GOD'S WORD

Consider the Context A Heart of Wisdom FOCUS: James 1:2-8

Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, 3 because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything. If any of you lacks wisdom, you of

should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you. But when you ask, you must believe and not doubt, because the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea, blown and tossed by the wind. That person should not expect to receive anything from the Lord. Such a person is double-minded and unstable in all they do. James 1:2-8 (NIV)
LOOK: Select one verse (or portion of a verse) to focus on and record it here:
LISTEN: Why did you select this verse? Journal your thoughts as you ponder this verse with the Lord.
LIVE IT OUT: How does this verse connect with your life? How do you sense the Lord inviting

you to respond to what He's laid on your heart regarding this verse?

LET IT LAST: Draw a quick picture to illustrate the main thing that stood out to you.

THE WISDOM OF QUESTIONS

If someone came up to you and asked, "What do I need to do to get eternal life?" how would you respond?

Would you dive in sharing the bridge or another illustration? Would you ask them if they'd like to start reading through the book of John with you? Or share your personal testimony?

At different times I've done each of these. But here's the crazy thing... that's not what Jesus did!

He responded with a question! (Matthew 19:16)

In fact, if you read through the gospels, nearly every time Jesus is asked a question, he responds with a question!

Not only can this help to clarify what the person is asking, it also engages them in dialogue, drawing them into the conversation.

This is not only helpful when doing evangelism, but especially when discipling someone. There's a fascinating verse in 1 John 2:27, "But you have received the Holy Spirit and he lives within you, so you don't need anyone to teach you what is true. For the Spirit teaches you everything you need to know, and what he teaches is true – it is not a lie. So just as he has taught you, remain in fellowship with Christ."

Once someone has entered into a relationship with Jesus, she has His Spirit living within her. And God's Spirit is so faithful to do what He's promised to do – to teach us... if we'll listen. Over and over I am amazed at how true this verse is.

As I grasp the reality of this I realize my main job in discipling someone is not to teach her, but to come alongside and encourage her to remain in fellowship with Christ, to help her learn how to place herself in a position where she is able to hear what God wants to teach her and to help her learn to persevere in doing this.

A great way to do this is to ask questions – and teach her to ask questions.

The first question I ever ask before meeting with someone is of God, "What do you want me doing with this woman today? How can I come alongside her and join in with what you're doing?"

Then I seek to start our time asking questions about how she's doing. I recently met with a precious young woman who wanted to learn about forgiveness. When I asked how she was doing she started to weep and share some painful things she was wrestling with. It quickly became apparent learning about forgiveness was not the main reason the Lord brought us

together. When I asked, "What lies do you think the enemy is trying to get you to believe right now?" what followed was one of the most amazing one on ones I've had. And I mostly listened! Then together we considered the truth God gives in His Word to combat those lies. And yes, we ended up in the last ten minutes talking about forgiveness as it tied in with what she was struggling with but do you see? Without asking questions I so easily could've missed out on what the Lord really wanted for our time!

When I'm having a shared quiet time with someone I'm helping her learn to ask, "Where do you want me to focus today in your Word, Lord?" "What do you want to say to me through this?" and "What difference do you want this to make in my life?"

You don't have a daily quiet time to "be a good Christian" or to earn God's favor. You have one because this is an incredible way to learn to listen to the Lord and remain in fellowship with Him, so when He wants to teach you something you're picking up on it and developing the discipline of responding and doing what He teaches you! I cannot stress how radically life changing this is!!!

Now while I initially may "teach" them what I do, note the focus is on them showing up to learn from the Lord. This helps them grow in their dependence on Him and not on me!

I need to be careful because it can be a heady thing having someone ask for your advice or ask you how to do something. My pride loves to demonstrate what I know. It's so easy for that to kick in without me even realizing it and suddenly a one on one becomes a monologue.

But you know, when I take time to ask questions that really helps save me (and the woman I'm meeting with!) from this!

Plus it's amazing how many times when I respond with a question I discover what she really is asking is rather different from what I first thought!

Good question asking is a skill. It's so much easier to "tell." But I have been amazed at how much more effective it is when my questions help people discover on their own the answer the Holy Spirit is giving them.

The good news is this is something anyone can grow in! So I'm asking God for the grace to be more like Him in this. And as I do, what a difference it's making in my discipling!

SELECT: a promise that connects with your life right now from either the Not The End section or one of the Promises on the bookmark

SHARE: how she can continue to learn more of God's promises and experience Him through them even beyond this booklet

READ: page 53 that summarizes the process included in this book to Memorize, Understand and Apply God's promises.

Have her teach you the promise she selects as you both memorize it together, first writing it on a 3X5 card, then memorizing it section by section.

APPLY

What could it look like for you to practically take God up on this promise?

How do you sense HIm inviting you to do so?

Even beyond this newest promise you just memorized, what could it look like for you to continue to take God up on His promises for the rest of your life?

What difference do you think it could make in your life if you continued to do this?

REMEMBER

In 2 Peter 1:3-4 God's promises are described as very great and precious. What comes to mind as you read that now?

Creatively Process: I love to bring two little boxes, gold or wooden, if possible, to represent a treasure chest, along with a bunch of 2x3 inch cardstock rectangles. On each rectangle we write as many Promises as we can remember, then we put them into our treasure chests.

What do you want to remember from this Bible study on the promises of God?

What could you do to help you remember this?

THE BLESSING OF EACH OTHER

Luke's account of the Christmas story begins with failure.

After years of disappointment Zechariah receives an angelic visitor telling him his prayer has been heard and his wife is going to bear him a son! But instead of joy, he responds with disbelief.

"How shall I know this? For I am an old man and my wife is advanced in years..." and he ends up voiceless for the next nine months as a consequence.

Fast forward ten verses and the angel Gabriel makes another visit, this time to a young girl. When he tells her she's going to get pregnant without ever having known a man, and before she's even married, she responds, after a little clarification, "Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word." What faith!

But here's the question ~ was Mary more spiritually mature than Zechariah?

Remember, Zechariah is introduced as being righteous before God, walking blamelessly in all the commandments and statutes of the Lord. That's a pretty incredible intro!

Now we can't measure spiritual maturity on the basis of this alone, but here's a thought ~ it's one thing to trust the Lord when you are young and have no idea what you're getting into. It's a whole other to trust him after decades of disappointment, when you've finally resigned yourself to the reality your last opportunity passed years ago, when you've hoped and hurt so many times...

Does this ever illustrate why we need each other! Why the Lord tells older believers to invest in younger ones! Not just so the young will benefit but so those older will too.

Yes, when you're older you've had more time for your roots to grow deeper into the Lord – no amount of excitement can ever take the place of that. But, well, I guess I should say each season of life brings challenges in trusting and following Jesus.

Younger believers often have a harder time persevering because their roots aren't as deep so there can be much benefit for them having someone older come alongside encouraging and helping them hang in there when life turns out far more difficult than they anticipated.

But for those who are older, there is something so invigorating about the optimism of youth, when you are with someone and they've first experienced Jesus and can't get enough time with Him! When they're ready to go anywhere in the world without a second thought or do whatever he calls them to do, no matter the cost! It can be so infectious! And spur you on to do the same!

I remember shortly after I became a Christian writing a poem that began...

I'll climb the highest mountain, I'll sail the roughest sea

I'll travel to any distant land and live life dangerously

I'll brave the harshest winter, pushing onward through sleet and snow

I'm ready Lord. Do with me as you will, just show me the way I should go...

And I spent my years in college sleeping on a reed mat on the floor of my dorm room getting ready to do pioneer missions, to take the gospel where it hadn't been before and meeting with anyone who showed any interest at all to share with them about Jesus!

I remember someone commenting once I was a gift to the woman I met with because I was so excited about anything that had to do with God, at a time when she was wrestling with the reality she was probably going to be single the rest of her life and discouraged over shattered dreams. I better understand this now.

As I approach 50 it's not quite as easy to climb those mountains, and after having endured this past week's negative zero temps, I'm not certain how eager I'd be to push onward through sleet and snow – that's not only cold, that's wet!!!

We had a national staff conference a couple weeks ago and were so blessed to have Jim Downing and Jerry and Jane Bridges join us. I got to see first hand – It's a whole lot harder for them to come to these conferences than it is for someone 80 years younger! But how blessed the younger staff are to have them there – and what a delight to see the joy on their faces as they interact with new staff!

If the Lord keeps me here I so hope to follow in their footsteps. I want to follow Jesus however, wherever, whenever with whomever, but I'm much more aware of the cost now.

Do those I meet with ever keep me on my toes, challenging me to go out of my comfort zone.

Here's one other thing – note where Mary heads right after she gets this news... Straight to Zechariah and Elizabeth's house! Can you imagine the incredible one on ones she shared with Elizabeth during their three months together? And what a blessing that was to her, too?!

Don't you just love how the Lord works things out so we all get blessed as together we follow him?!
